PATIENT UPDATE COLEMAN BRIDGE-PEFA

Back in June we featured a story about a young peregrine that was found under the Coleman Bridge. Upon being found this young-of-the-year bird was taken to Gloucester Animal Control. Because she was banded they called CCB, who had just banded this bird 2 days prior. Because she was not yet flight capable and might have been injured CCB directed that she be taken to NNWR to be checked out.

She was alert but very quiet upon arrival and Initial findings indicated mild dehydration. Palpation of the right leg suggested a possible injury which meant we would need to take her to a vet for radiographs (aka, x-rays). After the exam was finished this youngster was given quiet time to de-stress and then fed a meal of juicy cut up pieces of chicks which helped the dehydration. She was given a full check up at Warwick Animal Hospital with Dr. Dove.

The radiographs did not reveal any obvious injuries but she continued to hold the right leg/foot in an unusual way while resting or moving around. Because of the way she continued to hold her leg/land on her leg while flying we were uncomfortable with her ability to survive in the wild. The massive force with which a Peregrine Falcon strikes its prey (it's done in midair) requires perfectly functioning legs and feet otherwise they could end up with an injury so serious it would no longer able to hunt its food. After several months of observation it was determined that she was not correcting her stance and she was deemed non-releasable.

This past month she made her transition to her new home at EarthQuest Wildlife Education Center. She has been named Rachel and is already making appearances in some education programs. Robert Haynes -Director Of Operations for Earthquest Inc / Virginia had this to say about her transition. "She's gonna be an amazing addition to our programs to educate about the effects of DDT on our environment. She has got an amazing personality and has done great at the few presentations we've been able to bring her too."

GREAT HORNED OWL THE ULTIMATE PREDATOR

OWL WINGS ARE BUILT FOR

Comb-like edges muffle the sound of air moving over the wings, which allows them to fly silently.

OWLS:HUH FROM THE AIR

They are low altitude fliers in order to spot prey on the ground and can detect sounds nearly a third of a km away.

And other wildlife conflicts and questions.
